Statement by Bishop Libby following the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II

Today, I join with the whole United Kingdom, the Commonwealth and friends across the world, in expressing my sorrow at the death of Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II.

I know you will join me in sending our sincere condolences to His Majesty the King, Princess Anne, Prince Andrew and Prince Edward, and to the entire Royal Family and Royal households, with the assurance of our heartfelt prayers as they grieve. We pray they may know the peace and comfort of Christ in the loss of their mother, grandmother, greatgrandmother and friend.

And through our own grieving, individually and collectively, we give thanks to God for her long life and her dedicated service to this nation and the Commonwealth.

After so many decades in public service, I expect we will each have a memory or image of Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, engaged in such a wide range of contexts as she travelled the nation and the globe, and as she supported causes close to her heart. Her commitment to those seeking to help others was enormous – she was patron of hundreds charitable organisations. Her Late Majesty's personal faith was deep rooted and steadfast. In her Christmas message of 2014, she said: "For me, the life of Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, whose birth we celebrate today, is an inspiration and an anchor in my life. A role model of reconciliation and forgiveness, he stretched out his hands in love, acceptance and healing. Christ's example has taught me to seek to respect and value all people of whatever faith or none."

Her Late Majesty's strength of faith and her constant seeking to follow Christ through good times and bad in her own life, serves as a wonderful example to all of us at this difficult time.

I have a number of fond, personal memories of Her Late Majesty, from occasions public and personal. I recall her charming, welcoming and gracious manner and the complete attention she afforded me during our times together. I admired her lively engagement with issues facing the world, appreciated the interest she showed in me and my family, and valued the opportunity to reflect on our faith.

As we mourn and mark her passing, let us remember her always putting the interests of others ahead of her own and, in so doing, providing an outstanding example of Christian discipleship. As we look to the future, I pray we can take inspiration from her long life, well lived in the service of God and neighbour.

May Her Late Majesty rest in peace and rise in glory.

Heritage Open Days at St Giles Church, Killamarsh



After an absence of a couple of years due to Covid-19 restrictions, St Giles Church in Killamarsh will be taking part in the national Heritage Open Days festival in September. The festival is co-ordinated by the National Trust and encourages people to explore their local history and heritage.

Visitors will have the opportunity to see displays showing the history and heritage of St Giles Church, with leaflets highlighting areas of interest in and around the church. On entering the church, which dates from the 12th Century, they will be able to see beautiful stained glass windows, including one medieval window showing the Virgin Mary and infant Jesus and one which was the only war memorial in Killamarsh until the memorial on High Street at the end of Kirkcroft Lane was erected in 2011. Above the pulpit is a crucifix which came from the town of Oberammergau in Bavaria in 1900. The town is famous for its Passion Plays held every 10 years. There is a Norman font, which has an interesting history, and a Victorian font outside the church, which was used from the mid-19th Century until 1944. In the churchyard stands a Saxon preaching cross, near which, on the church wall, is a memorial to John Wright, a pauper. Further down the churchyard stand the village stocks, which remind us that the Lord of the Manor held court in church from time to time and the stocks were used to punish miscreants.



There will also be displays from the Killamarsh Heritage Society showing life in Killamarsh in former times. Lots to see and do.

The church will be open on Saturday, 10 September from 10.00 am to 4.00 pm and on Sunday, 11 September from 12.00 noon to 4.00 pm and it's all FREE. Refreshments will be available on both days and we look forward to welcoming visitors to our beautiful building.

Greenbelt Festival 2022

Over the August Bank Holiday weekend around 10,000 people gathered in the grounds of Boughton House near Kettering, Northamptonshire for the annual Christian festival known as Greenbelt. Described by its organisers as a festival of `artistry, activism and belief' it will celebrate its 50th anniversary next year. However, this year was particularly special as the festival, along with many others, had not taken place since 2019 due to the Covid Pandemic. Each year Greenbelt has a theme and this year's was `Wake Up' which seemed appropriate after the 3 year hiatus.

We have been attending the 4 day event every year it has taken place over the last 9 years and have found it to be a unique place of Christian community which is also open and welcoming to people of different faiths and none. Most people attending the festival bring their tents and camp in the surrounding grounds although many people visit daily and stay in greater comfort off-site. The event brings together Christians from across the country in church groups, community organisations or as individuals and there is a palpable sense of warmth, community and inclusiveness amongst those attending. There are 18 venues set up across the festival site from the main Glade stage (pictured above) to marquees and big top style tents hosting a wide range of events. The rich programme ranges from talks from diverse, high profile speakers to live theatre performances; a wide range of live music from folk, rock, indie, house, hip hop and punk bands; comedy and in the midst of all this, worship and prayer in the Shelter and Chapel venues. This year the festival hosted some well-known figures such as the former Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams, the writer, scientist and humanist, Richard Dawkins, the comedian, Shappi Khorsandi , Roxy Music's Brian Eno and critic and writer, Bonnie Greer. At the heart of the festival each year is the collective Communion service held at the main stage on Sunday morning when over 10,000 people gather to worship together from across the spectrum of Christian denominations and traditions. It is an unforgettable and very moving experience.

Much of this year's festival was focussed on Climate Change and included Luke Jerram's awe-inspiring touring artwork: Gaia. This is an internally lit suspended globe measuring 7 metres in diameter, created using NASA's imagery of the Earth's surface. To see the globe illuminated at night while installed at the heart of the festival was a very moving reminder of the beauty and fragility of our planetary home.

Each year Greenbelt provides an exciting and stimulating mixture of arts, discussion and debate, music, activism, community, faith and worship. For more information about the festival, visit https://www.greenbelt.org.uk/

A reflection on the state of the NHS

The fact that the NHS is in crisis is not in doubt, staff shortages and under investment by the government are daily news items. Junior doctors and nurses are reported as leaving the NHS quite simply because they are finding it difficult to make ends meet. The paucity of their wages bearing little or no relation to the immense responsibility placed on their shoulders. Yet there are many who continue to mediate God's love, by bringing healing to those in need in accordance with His will. "and he sent them out to proclaim the kingdom of God and to heal the sick." Luke 9:

Following a four night stay in the Coronary Care Unit at Calow Hospital and a one day visit to the Angiogram Suite in the Northern General in Sheffield, I can offer no praise high enough for the staff who work there. Yes, it soon became apparent that the NHS is suffering from a shortage of staff and a lack of financial investment. My personal experience was that no bed could be found for me following my admission with severe chest pains, which resulted in me spending my first night in hospital on a gurney in the bowels of A and E. This being said, the A and E department was incredibly busy with it being Bank Holiday Monday (lots of children with bouncy castle injuries). The staff were very apologetic with regard to the bed situation both during the night and later when I was transferred first to Medical Assessment and then on to Coronary Care.

The shortage of ambulances was highlighted a couple of days later when the ambulance timetabled to return me and a fellow patient to Chesterfield following an angiogram was assigned to another job which resulted in us having a four hour wait in Sheffield. I personally didn't mind this however, as it gave me the opportunity to admire the professionalism and kindness of the staff working there. In fact, wherever I found myself the doctors, nurses and other staff went above and beyond the call of duty to ensure my comfort and wellbeing.

For example, the Doctor in Medical Assessment left no stone unturned in diagnosing the cause of my chest pain. He finally concluded, after a number of ECG's, that I should be in Coronary Care where the staff there carried on the good work easing my anxiety with many a kind word. This was carried on in Sheffield where the angiogram team were at pains to ease the anxiety of their patients with a mixture of humour and reassuring words. It is in fact, true to say, that during my stay in hospital I was treated with the utmost kindness, dignity and care. Many times the words of Proverbs 12:25 came to mind "Anxiety weighs down the human heart,

but a kind word cheers it up."

Now I do not know how many of those charged with caring for me and the other patients were Christians, but I am sure that Christ was at work in all departments bringing healing to those in need.

There was, then, evidence of a shortage of staff and finance, but definitely no shortage of professionalism or loving kindness on the part of the doctors, nurses and other member staff, operating on the front line of healthcare. Good health is a universal right and, in his lavish grace, God mediates his healing through the many strands of the NHS to anyone that asks for it in faith. Revd. Michael
